Letter From The Pastor

May 2025

I just returned from visiting a friend in Western Nebraska. The weather wasn't the greatest, but we did get some sightseeing in, especially among the bluffs in the area.

I was struck by how different those bluffs are from the ones around here. Most were made by wind and stream deposits of sand and mud, wind deposits of volcanic ash, formed over centuries. They are sharply distinct from each other, with large spaces between them. They are covered mostly by grass and bushes that can survive in the shallow nutrient topsoil. I spent time in the information centers at these bluffs learning more about these "strange" (i.e. unfamiliar/previously unencountered by me) geological formations.



The ones here (such as Eagle Bluff) were carved out by waters of the Mississippi and other flowing water. Trees and other vegetation, as well as the wildlife that lives within them, are vibrant and active during most of the year. Yet these too are called bluffs.

How are two things that are the same 'thing' so different? Different origins, different looks, even different ways of being formed. Still, I have yet to hear anyone saying that Eagle Bluff isn't a real bluff because it was carved out, or that Scotts Bluff is not really a bluff because it was made from deposits over time. Both are part of the wonders of God's creation, even with these differences. Or perhaps because of these differences. And both are part of this country.

So why doesn't that same attitude carry over to how we view other human beings? Rather than extolling the wonder of God's diverse creation of people, formed by different events, genetics and experiences, I'm hearing more people bemoaning differences. Somehow the message of Jesus that we are to love our neighbor as ourselves has become disconnected from what many understand Christianity to be about today. Instead of celebrating differences among people more barriers are being set up in God's name.

The sense that only certain people are worthy of respect, of compassion, even of basic rights is being intentionally and methodically nurtured to grow, often disguised in language with religious overtones.

When Jesus is asked "who is my neighbor" he tells the parable of the Good Samaritan. Except no one listening to Jesus tell the parable would have called any Samaritan "good". Just the opposite The one who stopped and took care of the injured traveler on the side of the road, was of an ethnic and religious background Jesus' audience had been told were a hated enemy who caused real harm to them. That, Jesus says, is our neighbor. Not the closest people to you- but the one you'd really rather cross the street if you see coming the other way. The one who has hurt you, whether that hurt is real or imagined. The one you've been told all your life is an enemy, worst of the worse, a threat to all you hold dear and believe. Who would Jesus tell us today is our neighbor, the one we are to care about and for, to go out of our way to care for their needs even when it costs us?

I invite you to reflect with other church members, friends, and family on this question: Who are the "awful" or "dangerous" or "hateful" or "threats" or "depraved" that Jesus is trying to tell you are really your neighbors? The one you are to love with acts of service and care, to see as another beloved child of God even if you don't approve of the way that they are acting. It isn't loving our neighbor to accept bad, hurtful and unjust behavior no matter what. Or to be the continuing subject of abuse. That is the opposite of loving, for it allows our neighbor to continue to separate themselves from God and others. (Psychologically this is referred to as enabling.)

It IS allowing God to use us in ways that carve paths through centuries of hate, pride and fear even if the final effects won't be evident until long after we are gone. Loving our neighbor is trusting God enough to love and be loved, so that in our following of Christ layer after layer of compassion and mercy builds up and forms communities that welcome the stranger, reach out to those others scorn and ostracize through their actions and words, and declare the Good News that no one deserves to be treated as anything other than human, other than a beloved child of God. Including ourselves. To do so we will need to spend time and make the effort to learn about the differences we have with people, especially those that seem strange, or weird to us.

As Jesus did with all whom he met, we will need to listen to stories, to see people for who they are, and not what others have declared them to be. For sometimes a bluff is formed over time by wind depositing layers of various soils and rocks. Other times its formed by water carving its way through rock over time. But both are bluffs. And both are part of the wider Creation of God, beautiful in their own ways. As are we. Each and every one of us.




